From your President:

Greetings fellow Swamp foxes! Well, most of the major summertime contests are over and the heat is in full swing with the dog days of August upon us but no worries, the upcoming fall contest season is almost here!

This is the time to start thinking about station maintenance and planning for serious club competition so make sure you check those jumper cables and look for loose connections at the control point. I think we all have experienced at one time or another that something has went wrong with the connections from your rig to the PC, loose cables, bad com ports, aggravating interfaces that worked perfectly last weekend but for some dumb reason doesn't want to co-operate today...

Fall and winter are great for the lower bands so if you plan on working these bands, it might be a good idea to do some maintenance checks on your antenna. If you do not have one already, this would be a good time to construct and put up a new antenna.

You might want to also make sure that your existing antenna farm is operating correctly ready to go. Check your coaxes, ladder lines, and connections to your antennas for corrosion, breaks, and loose connections. I don't know about the rest of you but there have been many a contest that I decide to enter only to find out at the beginning of the contest that my antenna has a nice 10:1 SWR or even worse, is lying on the ground! And then there are those of us with backhoes and buried coax and control cables.....

August is going to be an exciting month for solar activities. On August 11th- the 13th, we have the Perseid Meteor Shower. For those of you who are interested in meteor scatter, this will be an excellent time to try to make some meteor scatter contacts.

Rates in past years were about 80 meteors an hour, but scientists are calling this an outburst year and are expecting between 150-200 meteors an hour. The meteor shower's peak is estimated to be around 1 p.m. EDT Aug. 12, which will have the best visibility and rates.

NASA advises that people who want to catch the shooting star display should allow their eyes 45 minutes to adjust. Then of course we have the upcoming solar eclipse on the $21^{\rm st}$ of August. This is a once in a lifetime (well for some of us youngsters) event that you do not want to miss.

The Ham Radio Science Citizen Investigation is preparing for the Solar Eclipse QSO Party on Monday, August 21st. Some of the changes will include shortened log submission deadlines, making all logs public once the contest results are published, encouraging in HF competition that logs use 1 kHz accuracy for improved log checking, & remote-controlled-station contest entries.



The World Wide Flora and Fauna Experience

Back in mid-March, fellow Swamp Foxes, Steve – W4SLT, Russ – W4STR, Tom – KK4CEW and I decided that we wanted to become active in the World Wide Flora and Fauna program. This is a radio activity that is very similar to the NPOTA event of last year. This is a worldwide event and stateside is known as Parks on the Air.

Upon investigating the various places to activate, it became apparent that there are more official sites than there were with the National Parks event. In fact, within our home territory, there were seven official sites within a short drive. We chose Devil's Fork State Park. The official designator is KFF-2892. Parks in the United States have a KFF prefix and an assigned number.

We arrived early and strung up our end fed wires. We used KX3s were our rigs and the total set-up time was less than 30 minutes. Russ W4STR got off to a rip roaring start by working approximately 30 stations. I struggled trying to activate the park as a digital station. It was extremely hard and almost impossible to see the computer screen. I finally gave up and went SSB. It also took me two trips to work about thirty stations.

On a third trip, we almost got skunked. The band conditions were terrible, and the fruits of our labor garnered us only three contacts. As Steve – W4SLT said, "It is not so much the destination as it is the trip." Well, he is right, although the sights at Devil's Fork State Park are outstanding, and the picnic area where we play radio could not be better. Part of the appeal of the event is getting out of the shack. It is also an excuse to tell the XYL that it requires some really low priced equipment. You know, an end-fed antenna wire doesn't cost much.

A fellow Swamp Fox – Tom Francis – W1TEF is also quite active in the KFF program. I frequently see post on Facebook where he is activating a park downstate. So if you want to experience something different, the WWFF program may be the ticket for you. For

Just based off of the parks and stations I worked during the NPOA program, I qualified for several certificates. This was quite a surprise and added to the excitement of the KFF program. I hope to work you soon.
