From your President:

Hello fellow Swamp Foxes, I hope that everyone is doing well. Can you believe that 2019 is just about halfway over? Summertime is officially here and so is the summer contest season. Despite the fact that there are not any major contests on the schedule for July, there certainly are a good variety of smaller contests to participate in.

Most of us tend to stick to the traditional contests operating either SSB or CW but what to do when there are no major contests going on? Well, why not try some of the contest with alternative modes like Feld Hell, RTTY, FT8 and other digi modes? They are certainly a lot of fun and can be very competitive.

If you would like to get your feet wet in the digi modes, than there are a few upcoming contests that fit the bill. For instance, as Bill N4IQ pointed out, the Feld Hell Sprint is this weekend, June 29, 00:00 until June 29 23:59. There is also the NCCC RTTY sprint, CWops Mini CWT test, and the DL-DX RTTY Contest on July 6th.

Be sure to mark your calendars, the 13 Colonies Special event starts on Monday July 1 (9AM Eastern) to July 7 (Midnight Eastern). We co-sponsor K2L along with the Columbia ARC and Dutch Fork ARC in this event, and our team consists of members from each of these clubs. A quick update on my station: As you all know, I took a direct lightning hit to our pole for SCE&G and AT&T last month. Progress on the rebuild is going very well. I have bought and installed two new rigs, a Yaesu FT-DX3000 and a Yaesu FT-991A. I have also replaced the damaged power supply, switchboxes, and antenna tuners. All new outlets and power surge units have been put in.

Thanks to the help of K4KWB and N4VZ one the PC's and a laptop that were destroyed have been replaced. All the antennas check out with the exception of the hex, which has 30 plus SWR across all bands. Not sure what the problem is, but I suspect that the lightning somehow got the antenna as well. Until I can get some help to get the antenna down, I am not really sure what is wrong with the antenna as of this writing. I suspect that the 1:1 balun may be bad, but who knows.

I am in the process of getting the rigs programmed and getting all radio related software installed and set up. It has been a daunting journey this past month, but I am happy to report that things are starting to look up again. I plan to be fully operational (sans one hex beam) in time for the upcoming 13 Colonies event. I want to thank each and every one of you for your devoted support, I was going through a very tough time with this and I appreciate it very much. One last thing, for those of you who were lucky enough to remember the old days of the Dayton hamfest, the old O'Hara building is no more. The roof was blown off the Hara Arena during storms and tornadoes on May 27-28, 2019. <u>Here is some aerial drone footage</u> of the damage from the storms.

The Adventure at NR4M, One Amazing Weekend!

In March 2019, I received an invitation to be part of the NR4M contest team at the Goat Farm during the 2019 CQWPX CW contest. I was very surprised to receive this invitation. I shared this with the family and they encouraged me to pursue the adventure and so I did!

I left Greenville, SC on 5/23 and I arrived at my Airbnb in Lynchburg, VA after driving about 6 hours. On Friday morning, contest day, I drove approximately 2 hours through the beautiful countryside and arrived at NR4M station about 4 hours before the contest.

I meet Steve, NR4M and Lucy the dog at the station house. He gave a quick tour and I met some of the other ops including my friends KC4D and K7SV. Other ops arrived closer to 8 pm. I got a bite to eat and then my goal was to talk with some of the ops and get acquainted with the operation stations, so I can a productive part of the team.

K7SV and several others were doing some last minute repairs several towers. N3AC had his climbing harness on. A few minutes before 0000z, all was in usable condition. The operating stations included K3, N1MM, paddles and an amp running the full legal limit. We operated 160-10m, with mult stations on 40m, 20m and 15m, so 9 ops could work the contest at the same time. My first slot on the team was to be the 20m Mult op. I had never done this before and I had barely used N1MM. I didn't reveal this fact to Steve until the after the contest. Since you couldn't have more than on signal on a band at the time, I had to work Mults while the run station was 'running'. The run operator was Chuck K4QS. I had to quickly learn how to operate the station while I learned to 'dance' with Chuck on 20m. It was similar to operating SO2R. It's an 'art' and it took about 30mins or so before I was rolling.

At this station, with band-dedicated towers at 200 feet, the bands were always open and I heard call signs that I'd never had heard before. After doing the multi op on 20m, I moved into the 'run' slot on 20m. Running was a 'piece of cake' compared to the mult op job. I did both positions on all the bands during my first 10 hours shift. The ops were amazing... This was my first experience in huge multi-

op and everyone but me had been to the Goat Farm many times. I was the 'new guy' on the team. After my first 30 mins on the air, all my jitters were gone and I was flying just like I had expected. I ran 20m most of the night and I heard B4T and stations from all over the world at S20! It was amazing! By the way, there was always something good to eat and an endless supply of beverages.

After 10 hours on the air, I crashed in my bunk at the main house. I slept for about 4-5 hours, showered and went back to work at the station. There were 18 team members but only 6-8 of us were there the entire weekend. I put in about 38 hours of air-time during the contest.

We didn't have a operator schedule. You relieved ops as needed and there were always ops available. I worked the night shift again on Saturday night, got some rest and then worked until the end of the contest. During late night on Saturday, we were always watching the online score board, we learned that LN8W had moved ahead of us in the top spot on that scoreboard. We put things into high gear and resumed our lead.

As I said earlier, with the amazing antennas and high power, we made our own band openings. Band conditions were great for us on all bands. A bit slower overnight, but we were still making lots of contacts. On Sunday afternoon around 5 pm or so, I worked the 40MULT station with N2YO as the run guy. Around 6 pm, Chip had to leave due to family situation, so I moved to the 40RUN position. We were at 1425 Qs on 40m at that time and Chip mentioned that it was going to be difficult if not impossible to break 1500 Qs by the end of the contest. I had two hours to kick-it, so I did. The band was crowded and noisy.... It was truly a 40m jungle at this time. I was running at 36 wpm for the first hour and then bumped it up to 38-40 wpm during hour 2. I was working probably 2-4 per minute during the last hour. At the end, we passed 1500 Qs with more to spare.

At 2400z, the rigs went dark and we wished one another safe journeys home. Most of the ops were from the local area, so they traveled home, but I stayed another night at the Goat Farm. Steve and I reflected on the contest in the den of the main house. On Monday, Steve and I had lunch in Fredericksburg. During lunch, he gave me an open invitation to join the NR4M in the future.

Kevan, N4XL told me that contesting would be different for me after my NR4M experience. He was correct. I am thankful to have had this awesome experience and I'll definitely be returning to the hills of Virginia for another contesting adventure.
